Grover Hardware Store/Laundromat 335 Main Street



Between Rand's Lumbervard on eastern Henry's Cove and Charles Grover's sawmill and lumber finishing business at 335 Main Street, millions of board feet were produced for the new and thriving summer colony on Grindstone and for the hotels of downtown Winter Harbor. Charles E. Grover lived from about 1859 to 1929. He was the youngest son of Captain Nathaniel Grover and nephew of Dr. Nathaniel and Eunice Pendleton, among the town's most prominent and wealthy citizens. Charles' great uncle, Edmund Grover, whose home is described to have been on the current golf course, is known to be a founding family of Winter Harbor. Charles served as selectman for several years and raised his family in the home occupied by Charles and Rose Arnett on the corner of Main Street and Harbor Road. Among other structures, Charles was the contractor for both Hammond Hall and the Winter Harbor High School.

After the Main Street fire of 1922, the Grovers assured the continuation of phone service, by installing a new switchboard in their kitchen, where daughter, Julia served as an operator. Harold Grover assumed the hardware carpentry business and is known to be the foreman in 1958 for the construction of the Capehart Housing (blue capes) off Newman Street for the Navy. Harold's wife, Rilla taught school in both Franklin and Winter Harbor.

The store left the Grover family in 1950, when Rilla sold the building to fellow teacher, Agrandece Healey. The building was transformed to The East Coast Shop; offering handicrafts, a lending library, books, antiques, toys, dishes and gifts. Miss Healey advertised jewelry made from gems from Maine mines and an apartment for 5 in a 1954 Peninsula Gazette. She provided tutoring in English, Latin and French and was a teacher and librarian at Fryeburg Academy during many winters.

The Main Street storefront welcomed photographer, William Sommerville and his wife Priscilla in 1976. The Sommervilles made a longterm commitment to Winter Harbor, raising their family here, but selling the building in 1985 to Elizabeth and Peter Hjorth of Sorrento. The recession of the 1980's left the building vacant, auctioned and passing through the ownership of banks and investors, including Keith Young and Paul Tracy.

Contractor, Jim McLean of Gouldsboro purchased the building in 1999, providing much needed repair and establishing a laundromat. Marcella Flubacher took on the building and rentals in 2003. The sale to Seaside Partners, LLC of Gouldsboro in 2013 has generated yet one more rebirth for this Main Street structure and we are happy to watch for its next chapter in our history.
